Classroom Management Cheat Sheet for Music Teachers

1. BEHAVIORAL NARRATION

- Behavioral Narration is a positive reinforcement tool .
- It is simply pointing out a student who is already exhibiting the desired behavior. This draws attention to the students who are following directions, instead of to the ones who are not meeting expectations.
- Instead of, "Johnny-you need to stay on task! Johnny you better turn to pg. 14 OR ELSE!", point out the GOOD behavior of the student next to him/her. "I see the that Darren has turned to pg. 14 in his book". If Johnny still hasn't straightened up, try pointing out another student's on-task behavior. "Sara has turned to pg. 14 in her book."
- Formula= (On-task student name) is doing (desired behavior).
- If you stay calm, this works the majority of the time.

2. HAVE A SYSTEM AND BE CONSISTENT

- The system that I use is called the
- "Rockin' Behavior System" that I created a couple of years ago. I draw a chart on the board or use this poster and laminate it (you can buy on my Teachers Pay Teachers store)



- How to use: If the class is all following directions and on-task as a group, I congratulate them and put a tally mark in the box (Daily Points box at the bottom). Once they get to 5 tally marks in the box, they get a sticker in the chart. (I use those little circular neon stickers from Walmart)
- When a class gets six stickers in their box, they get a shoutout on the morning announcements as the "Music Class of the Month", 15 minutes of free time at the end of the next class period (a party), and their class picture gets posted on my bulletin board in the hallway.

4. Rockin' Behavior Marks

• Post them where all the students can see them. Go over them often. Be consistent on the consequences. Have phone numbers of students and referrals handy so they can see that you are serious.

4. USE SEL STRATEGIES IN YOUR CLASSROOM

• When you incorporate Social Emotional Learning strategies into your classroom, you show your students that you care about how they feel, which builds respect. It's important to build a culture of respect, trust and positivity in the classroom. Here are 2 simple ways to incorporate SEL strategies into your music classroom.

 Have a mood meter or feelings chart as soon as the students walk in. Ask them to put a magnet on, or point to, the feeling they have that day.
As students walk in, greet them by making eye contact and asking them if they'd like a hug, handshake or high-five.

5. ATTENTION-GETTERS

- There is no need to lose your voice. If the kids start to get too loud, calmly use these attention getters. Be sure to teach these to them at the beginning of the school year.
- You can look up a lot of these on Pinterest or make up your own, but my favorites are:
- 1. Holey Money- GUACAMOLE
- 2. Hocus Pocus- EVERYBODY FOCUS
- 3. Clap a rhythm-they clap it back (such as ta, ta, ti-ti, ta)
- 4. Give me 5! (Hold up hand)
- 5. If you can hear my voice clap once. If you can hear my voice clap twice (and so on)
- 6. 1-2-3 eyes on me-1, 2, eyes on you!
- 7. Macaroni and Cheese-EVERYBODY FREEZE!

OTHER TIPS:

- Create a seating chart
- Have rewards/prizes ready
- Stay calm
